An Upcycling Future for Old Furniture and Objects

INTRODUCTION

Recycling practices are definitely the most popular ecological action people undertake nowadays. However, recycling may not be the answer to protect our environment from waste. Recycling practices are often quite expensive and require specific infrastructures.

So, what's new in the ecological world? What's better than recycling? Upcycling is the answer! As the word itself says, with upcycling we go further up than recycling. Thanks to this practice we can modify old products and give them a second life. Upcycling is different from recycling because it doesn't mean breaking down materials but rather sorting and reusing them in a different and more fashionable way. It is a way to "upgrade" old objects.

Upcycling products can also help to reduce costs and expenses, as you will save money on the original planned purchase of a new product. The creative aspects of upcycling are exciting and there are no limits. You have already noticed how trendy sofas made out of used wood pallets are now cropping up in local bars and restaurants. This is just one thing you can do, but there are so many ways that you can reuse your products. All it takes is some creativity!

TASK

You regularly attend the activities of the youth centre in your town. You spend time there with your friends and other students, so much so that it has become a very important place for you.

This year the director of the centre wants to renew the common rooms and has decided to directly involve its students by asking them to propose their ideas to update the centre's interior. A "call for tender" is launched by the centre; only the best project will be selected and will be taken into account to give a fresher appearance to the centre. The new project must be creative, useful and cheap to put in place.







You and your friends want to take this challenge. You heard about upcycling and think that using this practice would be ecological and fun, as it will allow you to give a new life to old materials/furniture and to unleash your creativity. In addition, there are a number of old objects in the centre's basement that you could use for your project. So, you decide to go for the upcycling option. But where to start from? Don't worry, the following steps of this WebQuest will drive you through the upcycling process!

PROCESS

Step 1: Getting started with upcycling.

You are very excited to search for creative ecological solutions to updating the interior of your favourite youth centre. You and your team have numerous ideas about the colours, the furniture and the use of the space. You know that upcycling can be a brilliant option for your project, but you need to know more about it if you want to convince the director of the centre about the effectiveness of your project.

The best place to start from is to find out why upcycling is important, what its benefits for you and the planet are and then to discover best upcycling ideas for interiors and how to implement your upcycling project.

Luckily, you have your laptops and smartphones with you! Working together with your team, you will have to do some online research that will provide you with information on what upcycling is and its advantages. After completing this research, the members of your group will ask the following questions for reflection on the topic:

- 1. How often have you thrown away objects or furniture that you could have upcycled instead?
- 2. Have you thought of objects in your home that you could upcycle?
- 3. Have you already been in a house, garden, shop, restaurant or bar with upcycled objects? What objects did you notice?
- 4. Do you think that upcycling could help in reducing waste?
- 5. Would you be able to upcycle your old objects?
- 6. Why is upcycling more effective than recycling?

Step 2: Upcycling ideas and techniques

Now that you have improved your knowledge on upcycling and its advantages for renewing an interior, you can now move to the next step: the best solutions and techniques to create beautiful furniture and decorations by giving a new life to old objects. Step 3: What to choose?

Your team has found a wide number of ideas and tips for upcycling interiors. You have all expressed your preferences, sometimes you agree, sometimes you don't. It's now time to get into the planning phase of your project.

First of all, you need to choose the objects you want to refurbish and make a list with your team. To select the best upcycling ideas, you can run a Pros and Cons activity with your friends. You can use one of the methods and templates proposed in the following websites or look for different ones:

Once you have your Pros and Cons table, you can start filling it in by asking the following questions to the members of your team:

- 1. Is this upcycling idea easy to implement?
- 2. Is it cheap to create?
- 3. What materials and tools do we need for it?
- 4. Is it useful for the centre?
- 5. Will it be fun to upcycle this item?
- 6. How long will it take?
- 7. Is there enough space for this furniture/object in the centre?
- 8. What about the colour, shape, material of the item? Will it match the centre's design and style?
- 9. Would the people who are attending activities in the centre like these changes?
- 10. Would it be practical for them?

Step 4: Designing your project.





Now that you have decided what upcycling ideas you will implement and what objects/furniture you will refurbish, you need to start planning. As you have learned in your research during Step 2, it is a great idea to draw the item before getting started. This will allow you to imagine what the upcycled object will look like once you will have finished and will help you identifying possible improvements and changes. This is the most creative phase of this WebQuest, which will give you a great insight into your final product!

You don't need to be a professional designer to make a first sketch of your new furniture! You can make very simple and basic drawings; the most important thing is to get a general idea of how the new furniture / object will look. You can use Pinterest again or other websites to get inspired and copy the drawing of a chair, table, framework or a flowerpot.

Then you will need to modify the drawing according to your upcycling ideas. Here are some sketches of furniture and objects:

Whether you want to reinvent unwanted materials or transform old ones into something new, a good idea is to draw the old object/furniture in the Before box and draw the upcycled idea into the After box. This will demonstrate what you can achieve through upcycling. You can use the template here below for that:

BEFORE	AFTER







To complete this table, each member of your team will draw the old version (BEFORE) and the upcycled version (AFTER) of a furniture or object you have selected in Step 3. If you have difficulties in drawing, you can ask your friends for help. Once all the drawings are ready, they will be presented to the team and you will run a short evaluation session to make sure that the drawings clearly highlight the difference between the old version and the new one. If some of the drawings don't show this difference, they can be corrected by the team.

The next step is to place these furniture and objects in the centre. Working together with your team, you will draw a plan of the centre's common room and place the furniture that you have selected and drawn, in the best place in the room.

Step 5: A Persuasive Presentation for a Winning Project.

Since the beginning of this WebQuest you have learned a lot about upcycling, why it is important to use this ecological technique and what its advantages are. But bear in mind that if you want to be selected for the restyle of new centre, you need to convince the director that your project is the best and that upcycling techniques will bring great benefits to the centre and to the environment.

The best way to present your project is to create a persuasive presentation that will illustrate your project idea and will explain why you chose to use upcycling. Your presentation will include the list of furniture and objects, its drawings and the plan of the common room of the centre, where the furniture will be placed.

You know that presentations can be very boring sometimes and you don't want to miss the chance to get your idea chosen! So, you will need to use effective methods and attractive digital tools for presenting your project that will convince the director about the quality of your idea. With your team, do some research on the best techniques for creating and giving a presentation, you can start from here:

- Did you have any problem in making decisions when working in group?
- Was it hard for you to rehearse the presentation in front of your teammates?
- What activity of this WebQuest did you enjoy the most?
- In your opinion, what was the most difficult aspect of the activity?
- Would you apply the knowledge you have acquired through this WebQuest to your everyday life?
- Will you use upcycling practices at home?
- Do you think that from doing this WebQuest that you will talk about upcycling and its environmental impact with your friends and/or family?













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
